

### Suggested Equipment List

- Camera equipment & plenty of film and batteries
  - Binoculars
  - Good quality sunglasses
  - Hat or cap
  - t-shirts—dark colors eg khaki—DO NOT BRING WHITE/LIGHT COLORS!!!
  - 1 long sleeved cotton shirt—dark colors—khaki is best—also, please no on sleeveless shirts or very short shorts
  - Shorts—dark colors eg khaki
  - 1 pair long pants-ones that convert to shorts work very well
  - Underwear and socks-plenty of latter
  - Good hiking boots
  - Flip flops or water shoes
  - Sweatshirt, fleece, or sweater—these should all be of dark and/or dull colors—eg khaki
  - Light jacket—same for colors
  - Towels
  - Personal toiletries – soap, moisturizing cream, sun block, tissues, etc.
  - Water bottle
  - Malaria tablets-DON'T FORGET
  - Anti-histamine cream & insect repellent
  - Basic personal medical kit (aspirin, band-aids, stuff for blisters, etc.)
  - Pocket knife and/or Leatherman (put in your checked baggage
  - Compass
  - Flashlight and spare batteries (a really good one such as a Maglite because you want to be able to see the creatures of the night!)
  - Lip balm
  - Mosquito repellent
  - If you wear contact lenses we recommend that you bring along extras as well as a pair of glasses as well
  - Heavy jacket, gloves and hat for cold weather months May-September (Spring weight is usually good for driving in open vehicles
  - Sleeping bag and travel pillow (tents have cots).
- Please limit baggage to ONE bag or backpack to check. Also, bring one daypack to carry on. Bring a small padlock-for the foot-lockers in the tents.
- Do not bring items requiring electricity-there is any available. Do not bring portable electronics. The local conditions will ruin most electronic devices—ipod ok if you are careful.
- Notebook, pens and pencils as well as a small field notebook
- Laundry services are available on site so don't bring everything you own (this is primitive so don't bring anything you don't want ruined.).
- Cash—most students bring more than the faculty. We suggest more than \$200 US. Extra drinks and snacks are available at the camp (bring some of your own snacks from home), but are fairly expensive because this is in the bush. One person will be assigned the job as group accountant for snacks etc. We usually pool together some money as a tip for the camp workers—who usually do a great job for us. Finally, gifts for yourself and those back home will usually require additional cash—entrance to the park usually has lots of roadside sales, as does the airport.
